## Merging with Indigenous Leaders

In March 2021, one of our long-time visions was actualized. We are honored to have signed a 5-yr agreement with the Guna Yala General Congress, the leaders of one of the seven Indigenous groups in Panama.

This unprecedented agreement allows us to conduct wildlife research using trail cameras in the Nargana Wildlands, one of the largest remaining intact forests in the country, located within the Guna Yala territory. Gaining access to this understudied forest will increase our knowledge of its jaguar and prey populations.

More importantly, engagement with the Guna communities and educational outreach will enhance our wildlife conservation efforts. Also, by merging applied science with the Guna's traditional ecological knowledge, we will take the region's conservation management plans to the next level.

Researching New Jaguar Territories


Last year we began planning for our 2021 field season in the Nargana Wildlands, a new territory for Team Kaminando, and visiting the area required many logistical details. In addition to setting 40 additional camera traps, August marked our first expedition to two communities called, Mandiyala and Gangandi.

Collaborating with Indigenous Woman's Groups

We are also delighted to be collaborating with an Indigenous woman's group (Organización de Mujeres Indígenous Unidas por la Biodiversidad de Panamá) that provides us with bilingual (Spanish-Kuna) interpreters while visiting the Guna villages.

As this year comes to a close, it is hard to ignore the threats facing the future of our planet, from pandemics to extinction, and climate change.

BUT, with dedicated people and organizations like ours, there is still hope!
